Check each agency for specifics, but generally, student program participants are eligible for paid time off, sick leave and holiday leave. Agencies may also assist with short-term housing arrangements.

Should you decide to join an IC agency as an employee, you will have many opportunities to continue learning, growing and exploring new paths through a variety of educational and training programs, including tuition assistance for advanced degrees, as well as opportunities for travel and assignments outside your home office.

Requirements

To work or intern in the IC, you must be a U.S. citizen and be eligible for a Security Clearance. All applicants selected for hire will undergo an extensive background investigation and drug screening. Some agencies also require a polygraph exam.

The IC is committed to building a workforce that represents the rich diversity of the world we live in: a workforce that reflects different cultural backgrounds, ethnicities and heritage, languages, races, gender, orientation, abilities and ideas.



What You Can Do

Wherever you serve within the Intelligence Community, you will be working to defeat terrorism at home and abroad, prevent and counter the spread of weapons of mass destruction, protect the health of deployed military forces, and develop innovative ways to detect and analyze threats. Here are some examples of how students can learn more about and contribute to the mission:

- **Internships**
Most IC agencies offer paid summer internships. Some offer year-round programs for high school students and graduate students.
- **IC CAE**
The Intelligence Community Centers for Academic Excellence (IC CAE) Program provides students an opportunity to study intelligence and national security through an IC-related certificate, minor or graduate education program at various universities. - **Cooperative Education Programs**
A few IC agencies offer co-op programs, which alternate periods of full-time employment with periods of full-time study.

- **Scholarships and Fellowships**
 - **Pat Roberts Intelligence Scholars Program (PRISP)** – This program trains highly-qualified college graduates with specific skills critical to the IC, and either pays for a portion of their undergraduate education, or pays for their graduate-level education in the critical skill areas needed.  - **Stokes Educational Scholarship Program (DIA, NSA & NGA)** – Also known as the Undergraduate Training Assistance Program at DIA, this program provides tuition and required fees toward an undergraduate degree while providing the student full-time employment during summer vacation while in college.  - **Undergraduate and Graduate Scholar Programs (CIA)** – Financial need-based programs that offer students unmatched experience in a diverse and inclusive environment.  - **Science, Mathematics and Research for Transformation (SMART)** – Students, including current Department of Defense employees seeking advanced degrees, work in a full-time, paid summer internship.
