The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Office of Intelligence and Analysis is proud to participate in the Intelligence Community (IC) Wounded Warrior Internship Program, which helps ill or injured soldiers transition back to military life or the civilian workforce.

These short-term internships are designed for the warfighter who is recovering at a medical treatment facility. Interns in the DHS Office of Intelligence and Analysis (I&A) may work approximately 20 hours a week in mission areas like:

- Intelligence Analysis (Cybersecurity, Counterterrorism, Transnational Organized Crime)
- Intelligence Operations (Counterintelligence)
- Administrative Support
- Information Technology

WHAT YOU'LL DO

You may conduct research, collect intelligence, assess and analyze threats, develop policies and procedures, or perform administrative tasks like travel and conference coordination, payroll and budget, financial management and property accountability.

HOW TO GET STARTED

You must obtain the proper medical clearance and register with the Operation Warfighter (OWF) Program within the Department of Defense by contacting OSD.OWF@mail.mil. Local OWF coordinators and IC Wounded Warrior Program coordinators can help you identify an opportunity that aligns with your skills and interests.
